He defended the Catholic

"To have courage for whatever comes in life – everything lies in that," wrote St. Teresa of Avila. The Franciscans boldly traveled without soldiers or any sort of protection into

an unknown land to preach the Gospel. When told of the coming danger, the martyrs bravely refused to flee for their lives. Through the Georgia Martyrs' intercession, I pray for the courage to instruct the ignorant

and counsel the doubtful when my Catholic faith is spoken of wrongly.

Throughout all the trials of adapting to a new life, the Georgia Martyrs showed outstanding perseverance. They learned the difficult Native American language of the Guales. They gained the peoples' trust by adapting to Guale life in order to convert them to Christianity. "It is easy to find the truth, though it is hard to face it, and harder still to follow it," said Archbishop Fulton Sheen. When the great chieftain of the Guales asked to be married to another woman, the friars forbid the laws of marriage to be broken, upholding reverence for the sacrament of Matrimony. They were willing to die rather than compromise on the truths of the Church. My love of truth has been strengthened by the example the Georgia Martyrs have set before me.

The Georgia Martyrs have inspired me in many ways. Whether I am to get married and have children, or I am called to religious life as a nun, I do not know. The path I am walking has a bend in it that I have not reached. The saints are like torches lighting my way. "If you are who you are meant to be, you will set the whole world on fire," said St. Catherine of Siena. Every man is called to live as a child of God, and soon I am to be knighted as a soldier of Christ in Confirmation. Learning and praying to the Georgia Martyrs has helped prepare me

for this. Their lives have inspired me to live my faith loyally and profess it outrageously.
